The Foundation students were introduced to Yayoi Kusama, a Japanese artist who is known for her bright, colourful artwork that features polka dots. In fact, she is sometimes called *"The Princess of Polka Dots"*. The students began by drawing their Kusama Cat and then had to add multiple circle SHAPES to their cat to create REPETITION.









The grade 1 and 2 students are continuing their study about Yayoi Kusama, the Japanese artist who loves polka dots. They created their collage paper using paint and sponges and then used them to create their flowers. Yayoi Kusama began her career drawing flowers and added polka dots to them.







The grade 3 and 4 students have been introduced to an artist, Pete Cromer. He is renowned for his signature bursts of glowing colour and textures. The students are creating their own animal collage using watercolours and paper collage.



The grade 5 and 6 students have been introduced to an Australian artist Howard Arkley who is renowned for his colourful suburban houses using both patterns and texture. The students have used their own house to create a masterpiece similar to Arkley's famous pieces.

Mental Health in Primary Schools



Hello everyone! I'm Laura James (Miss Laura) and I am the Mental Health and Wellbeing Coordinator (MHAWC– "M hawk") here at Dana Street. I am here at school on a Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and my job is to support student wellbeing needs across the school as well as supporting teachers in the area of teaching social and emotional learning through our wellbeing curriculum.

This year our school is participating in a pilot program called Mental Health in Primary School (MHiPS). This program is in partnership with the Murdoch's Children Research Institute (MCRI), Melbourne Graduate School of

Education at the University of Melbourne (MGSE) and the Victorian Department of Education and Training (DET). The aim of the program is to provide more mental health support in primary schools and to test what works to support the mental health and wellbeing of primary school students.



Year 3/4 Narrative Writing Cycle

For the first half of this term, our Year 3/4 students completed the Narrative Writing Cycle. They commenced the cycle by exploring what narratives are and the structure of them. We then generated lots of ideas within our newly created Writers Notebooks, focusing on the different elements of Narratives; including setting, character, complication and resolution. Students mined through these ideas and placed them into their narrative planners.

The drafting process then commenced, with students using their plans to as a guide for their narratives. During each writing session, students revised and edited their work, focusing on including similes and metaphors. The important concept of 'Show don't Tell' was explored, with students using their senses to show the reader what was occurring, rather than telling them.

The most important step in the writing cycle is publishing. Students were able to create a front cover for their narrative and publish a selected, favourite part of their narrative, which have been placed within their Portfolio's. Students are extremely proud of their narratives and were highly engaged throughout the writing cycle to create en-











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
