The day consisted of four workshops. In the first workshop, illustrator and Author Ben Sanders facilitated an illustration activity. This workshop had students examine how pictures help tell a story and the importance of selecting the right pictures.
In the second workshop, author Corinne Fenton explained her writing process. She explained how she has been able to turn her ideas into stories and then the process of having her work published.
In the third workshop, Paige Duggan talked about ideas and strong emotions. She helped students identify issues they were passionate about and how to pair them with an emotion and a solution.
In the fourth workshop, students explored scene setting. Students spent time at the train station to inspire their writing about a journey.
